Dear EDC investors and stakeholders,

I am truly humbled by the opportunity to lead the dedicated and talented EDC Board of Directors and staff as we work to improve the quality of life for all St. Lucie County

After many years of investment, planning, and hard work, the EDC's efforts to bring quality jobs to the county and to diversify the local economy have borne tremendous fruit. A recent study indicated that EDC projects announced between 2017 and mid-2021 will result in more than 10,000 jobs and more than \$1.8 billion in economic gain. The return on investment cited in that same report was a gain of \$24.65 for each and every tax dollar invested in the EDC and a gain of \$89.60 for each and every dollar of private investment made. As a CPA, I can tell you that you don't see returns like this every day!

What we do at the EDC, however, goes far beyond numbers. We improve lives. Those 10,000 jobs mean that 10,000 fewer workers need to commute far from home for a goodpaying job. That economic gain allows tax rates to be reduced for all and helps fund needed services throughout the community.

The EDC also works in partnership with St. Lucie Public Schools, Indian River State College, Project LIFT, the Treasure Coast Manufacturers Association, the Treasure Coast Builders Association, CareerSource Research Coast and others to strengthen workforce readiness and support job training.

Over the past year, a new challenge has come to the forefront in our community. Once known as southeast Florida's most affordable housing market, home prices and rents here have recently skyrocketed, leaving many of our residents in dire straits. The EDC's Board of Directors held a Strategic Doing™ retreat in April to identify opportunities to expand our leadership on workforce readiness and to seek out ways to effectively address workforce housing challenges. In the coming months, the EDC will be working with the county and cities to determine the extent of our area's complex housing problems and evaluate ways to ease the impacts.

Thank you for taking the time to read our Mid-Year Report and thanks to all the EDC's partners; success is impossible without you!

It's hard to believe it's already time for another Mid-Year Report. This past year has been so eventful time has truly flown.

We closed out 2021 with Accel International's long-awaited groundbreaking; the project's GC, Itasca Construction, anticipates delivery of the 150,000-square-foot wire manufacturing facility before the end of the year. Amazon announced its third St. Lucie County facility in January and also began construction on its 1.1 million-square-foot fulfillment center. At Legacy Park, we held a groundbreaking for Cheney Brothers in April while construction also began on the Sansone Group's two spec buildings and the Amazon delivery station. And in May, Stonemont Financial Group broke ground at the South Florida Logistics Center 95, for what will be the largest building in northern St. Lucie County at 1.1 million square feet. Construction is also underway at Pursuit Boats, the Interstate Crossroads Business Center, and Kings Logistics Center.

But, that's not all. Over the last five months, the EDC has worked on 11 new projects representing a capital investment of \$201.4 million, 2.8 million square feet of space, and 1,709

Opening is anticipated in early fall and the EDC will be further assisting Amazon with job fairs and recruitment.

- St. Lucie Commerce Center, an industrial park by Hope Commercial Holdings off Selvitz Road, received approvals in May from the Fort Pierce City Commission
- Islamorada Beer Company is expanding both its footprint and its offerings, adding a distillery to its brewery operations and a warehouse and distribution facility
- Walls are going up on the Sansone Group's two spec facilities in Legacy Park. The 168,000- and 520,000-square-foot buildings bring the completed
- or under-construction square footage in the Port St. Lucie park to more than 1.5 million.
- JBL Asset Management received final site plan approval for a 207,458-square-foot Class-A warehouse building fronting I-95 in Fort Pierce.

St. Lucie County has truly been discovered! As you know, many of the projects we work on remain confidential until plans are ready to submit to our cities and county. We've had remarkable interest in our county from the distribution/logistics industry, but that's not all. We are currently working with technology, research & development, and advanced manufacturing companies, as well as on potential location of regional headquarters, all of which would bring a variety of great jobs here.

The EDC has also been busy with events, workforce initiatives, marketing outreach, and much more, as you'll see in the pages that follow. There is one additional item to mention, however. Jill Marasa accepted an exceptional offer from Ashley Capital in April and left her position as EDC vice president. She continues to consult with us as a search committee works on finding a replacement capable of filling her exceptional high heels. The good news is that Jill is representing Ashley here on the Treasure Coast and we look forward to working with her on economic development projects in the months and years to come.

Islamorada Beer Company

DISTILLERY

Islamorada Beer Company, headquartered in Monroe County, opened a 25,000-square-foot brewery in Fort Pierce in 2016. In 2022, they added a 19,841-square-foot building for a hard liquor distillery to make rum, vodka and bourbon at the same location, adding 15 employees.





Islamorada Beer Company

WAREHOUSE

In addition to the distillery, Islamorada is adding another 22,000 square feet of warehouse space on Industrial Avenue in Fort Pierce. The company is purchasing a vacant countyowned building for \$1.5 million, which the EDC had assisted the county in marketing.





Pursuit Boats

EXPANSION 2 PHASE 2

In the second phase of this four-phase expansion plan, Pursuit Boats is adding another 100,000 square feet of manufacturing space to its Fort Pierce campus. The company had 404 employees in 2019 when the first phase of the current expansion plan began and finished 2021 with 634 employees.

Business Attraction





Amazon chose Legacy Park at Tradition for its third St. Lucie County facility, a 220,000-square-foot last-mile delivery station that will employ up to 200 full-time, with additional employment opportunities available through contracted delivery service providers. Hiring is anticipated to begin for this facility in late summer or early fall.



Interstate Commerce Center

JBL Asset Management is developing Class-A industrial facilities for mid-size users I-95 just south of Okeechobee Road in Fort Pierce. The 207,458-square-foot facility will have 1,300 feet of frontage on I-95 and is anticipated to be completed by the end of 2022. Projected employment at completion is 136.



Legacy Park at Tradition Spec A

The Sansone Group is developing several Class-A speculative industrial facilities in its Port St. Lucie business park. Currently under construction is a 168,000-square-foot rear-load building with immediate I-95 access.



Legacy Park at Tradition Spec B

Also under construction is a 520,000-square-foot cross-dock industrial building in the business park. Neighbors are Amazon, FedEx Ground, and Cheney Brothers. At build-out, Legacy Park will have more than 5 million square feet of facilities and employ more than 3,000 people.



MJC Express

MJC Express is a hauling company, headquartered in Plantation, that provides transportation services for more than 5,000 brokers and customers throughout the U.S. The EDC provided site location assistance for reuse of a 6,000-square-foot warehouse on Orange Avenue West. The company anticipates employing 25 in that location.



St. Lucie Commerce Center

Hope Commercial Holdings is developing 1.2 million square feet of industrial facilities across six buildings on Energy Lane, off Selvitz Road, in Fort Pierce. The company's site plan for warehouse, flex and light manufacturing uses was approved in May. Based on industry averages, the end users could employ approximately 733.



Tenet Health

Tenet Health, which operates a surgery center in Tradition as well as the Good Samaritan Medical Center and St. Mary's Medical Center in West Palm Beach, is building a new 54-bed hospital at Becker Road and Florida's Turnpike. The 181,925-square-foot facility, which would employ approximately 600 full-time, part-time and per-diem staffers, is expected to break ground in late summer or early fall, with completion in late 2024.



Treasure Coast Vault

Treasure Coast Vault will encompass six buildings with a total of 88,400 square feet for storage of RVs, automobiles and boats, to be sold as private condominium units. The project also includes open, covered storage space and 36 flex industrial units for business use and is located on St. Lucie Boulevard in Fort Pierce.



Industrial Developments for Lease and/or Build-To-Suit

Stonemont Financial Group – South Florida Logistics Center 95 – 1.3 million SF of Class-A industrial spec development for lease from 50,000 SF; two buildings: 1.1 million SF cross-dock and 245,300 SF rearload at Kings Highway and Orange Ave.

Seefried Industrial Properties – Kings Logistics Center – 658,000 SF Class-A cross-dock for lease from 300,000 SF at Kings Highway and Orange Ave.

SL Industrial Partners – Interstate Crossroads Business Center – 1.1 million SF of contiguous cross-dock located between I-95 and Florida's Turnpike.

JBL Asset Management – **Interstate Commerce Center** – 207,458 SF Class-A warehouse with 1,300 feet of direct I-95 visibility for lease from 25,000 SF.

Hope Commercial Holdings – St. Lucie Commerce Center – 1.2 million SF of flex and warehouse space over six buildings from 50,000–585,000 SF on Energy Lane.

Seefried Industrial Properties – Project Glades – 354,200 SF of warehouse/light industrial development off LTC Parkway. Two buildings: 192,500 SF and 161,700 SF.

SL Industrial Partners – Glades Commerce Center – 287,500 SF across six buildings from 16,500 SF to 63,000 SF in LTC Ranch.

Sansone Group – Legacy Park at Tradition – 688,000 Class–A industrial spec development for lease plus build-to-suit property available off I–95 at Becker Road. Two buildings: 520,000 SF cross-dock and 168,000 SF rear-load.

Amazon Delivery Station



Amazon delivery station at Legacy Park as of May 2022.

Previously reported as Project Senior, a 220,000-square-foot **Amazon** last-mile distribution station is under construction in Legacy Park at Tradition. Between 170-200 people will be hired to work full time preparing customer orders for delivery within 45 miles of the distribution station. Hiring is anticipated to begin in August or September for operations beginning early fourth quarter.

Amazon workers start at a minimum of \$15/hour and receive comprehensive benefits from their first day of work, including an innovative Career Choice program which pays 95% of tuition and fees toward a certificate or diploma in qualified fields of study that lead to in-demand jobs. In addition to the jobs within the delivery station, employment

opportunities will be available with Amazon's independent delivery service partners.

The EDC assisted with expedited site plan review and master site plan approval in 57 days. Amazon is not receiving any tax abatements or financial incentives.





In May, **Chandler Bats** relocated its headquarters and manufacturing operations from Pennsylvania to a 17,000-square-foot facility off Commerce Centre Drive in St. Lucie West. The company will employ approximately 11 people.

In business since 2009, Chandler is a premier manufacturer of wood bats used in major league and international baseball. Chandler Bats are the gold standard among Major League Baseball's top stars, as well as for players at all levels.



The EDC, with the help of Enterprise Florida, assisted Chandler in obtaining international trade certification and a grant to offset the certification costs, and connected the company with the Treasure Coast Sports Commission, which helped Chandler navigate the process in record time so the company's bats could be used in the Olympic qualifier games held at Clover Park in 2021.





Contender Boats

Contender Boats began hiring this spring for the 200 new positions the manufacturer of premium semi-custom sportfishing boats will need for its new facility in Fort Pierce. The Homestead-based boatbuilder renovated the 100,000-square-foot iconic Packers of Indian River facility off Midway Road.

Since the 2003/2004 hurricane season, St. Lucie County citrus production has declined significantly while our county's marine industry has continued to expand. This building, where approximately 200 people used to work packing fruit, will now be the workplace for 200 people building boats.

Contender has been building boats for 35+ years. The company's semi-custom boats excel in tournament fishing, for family outings and commercial use. With a Contender, the customer chooses engine power, t-top, tower, helm layout, console, leaning post, electronics, and other options for fishing, seating, and general comfort.

Islamorada Beer Company opened a 25,000-square-foot brewery in Fort Pierce in 2016. In 2022, the company expanded by adding a 19,841-square-foot building for a hard liquor distillery in the same location as the brewery and added 15 employees.

Requiring storage for additional product lines, Islamorada purchased a 22,000-square-foot warehouse nearby on Industrial Avenue, a previously vacant county-owned building, for \$1.5 million – putting this commercial property back on the tax rolls.

Visitors to Islamorada Beer Company's tap room on St. Lucie Boulevard can choose from the ever-popular Sandbar Sunday or 16 other beers on tap – ranging from Sunscorched (a mango habanero wheat ale) to You Got A-Peel (IPA with Indian River grapefruit). Now, the distillery's hard liquors, vodka sodas and mixed drinks (including the one-and-only frozen key lime pie cocktail) are also available at the tap room.





Workforce initiatives/Strategic Doing™

The EDC began its workforce initiatives in 2016 with the undertaking of the Treasure Coast Skills Gap study that resulted in key recommendations for skills development in targeted employment sectors. Since then, the EDC has led follow-up studies and a variety of initiatives based on a six-step action plan that guides ongoing efforts to close skills gaps in our region.



Strategic Doing™ 2022

Imagine if St. Lucie County grew and retained a high-quality workforce because skilled workers were attracted by our community's quality of life, sustainable jobs and abundant affordable housing. – Strategic Doing 2022 framing statement.

On April 21, the EDC Board of Directors and other community leaders participated in a half-day Strategic Doing workshop using the framing statement above to guide discussion. Break-out groups explored potential updates and additions to our existing workforce readiness programs and, due to the sharp increase in area housing costs and the resulting impact on our workforce, began a new planning process to identify ways the EDC can assist in supporting affordable workforce housing efforts. Work on these efforts will be ongoing.





Ready-to-Work Boot Camp

The EDC and Treasure Coast Manufacturers Association joined forces with the Treasure Coast Builders Association for this year's Ready-to-Work Skilled Trades Boot Camp which graduated 33 young people in June. The week-long, hands-on camp was held at Project LIFT in Palm City; young adults ages 18-21 from both St. Lucie and Martin counties participated. The campers were able to try their hands at skills ranging from plumbing, welding, screening and auto repair to HVAC, carpentry and more. Thanks to a grant obtained through Project LIFT, the participants even earned a paycheck!

St. Lucie County employers Contender Boats, Freshco/Indian River Select, The Porch Factory, Pursuit Boats and Walmart Distribution Center participated in signing day ceremonies where the employers had the opportunity to interview and potentially hire camp participants.



TCMakers

The EDC is participating with Sinclair Broadcasting, Indian River State College, CareerSource Research Coast and the other Treasure Coast economic development organizations in a campaign to build awareness of and create interest in careers in manufacturing and the skilled trades.

Counselor Tour

#WorkLocalStLucie campaign initiatives during the first six months of 2022 included:






A unique advertising campaign using the **navigation app Waze**. As commuters using the app crossed Becker Road traveling south in the mornings and north in the evenings on I-95, the turnpike or Citrus Blvd., they received advertising messages urging them to "Quit Your Commute" and directing them to the EDC's website. Between January 19 and May 16, this message was served 145,185 times with a unique reach of 34,949. Because the Waze campaign was the first its kind in the industry, our advertising received earned media publicity, including a feature story on WPTV and in tech blogs.

Treasure Coast Manufacturers Association

In 2016, the EDC worked with a committed group of local manufacturers to incorporate this regional trade association. As the organization grew over the following six years, the EDC provided staff support, communications, marketing, event management, membership services and more. In 2022, the TCMA took the next step forward and engaged an executive director with a manufacturing background, Duane Reiff. As Duane also provides manufacturing consulting to the Florida Small Business Development Center at Indian River State College (SBDC), a unique opportunity arose to enhance and expand services to the organization through a formalized partnership between the two organizations. On May 11, the administrative and support functions for the TCMA were transferred from the EDC to the SBDC.

Tax Abatement Renewal Campaign

The EDC successfully assisted the City of Port St. Lucie with its public information campaign for the renewal of the city council's ability to offer time-limited tax abatements to targeted industry employers making substantial capital investments and bringing higher-paying jobs to the city. Voters approved the referendum in December with 59% voting yes.

This extremely important economic development tool will be on the August 23 ballots for all voters in the county, along with a separate ballot referendum for City of Fort Pierce voters. The EDC has revamped its special web pages and collateral material and is working to assist county and city staff members with their public education efforts. Habitat for Humanity Playhouse Build

The EDC partnered with the Treasure Coast Builders Association (TCBA) in March to participate in the St. Lucie Habitat for Humanity Playhouse Build 2022. The EDC/TCBA team built a playhouse for a veteran family (both the mother and father had served) with three children. 
